Summary of essential elements of citing / Referee's report / Incident footage

The Player tackled Delta 22B. In the process of so doing the Player lifted 22B resulting in 22B ending up in a vertical position with his legs in the air. 22B lands on his neck/head area. The citing commissioner comments that the tackle "starts legal ends in foul play". The citing commissioner also records that the contact by 22B with the ground was "with sufficient force to represent a high degree of danger". Although the citing commissioner noted the involvement of 12B in the dynamic of the incident he still considered the action of the Player merited a RC and not just the YC issued by the referee at the time.

Essential elements of other evidence (e.g. medical reports)
None – 22B was not injured as a result of the impact with the ground.
Summary of player's evidence
The Player stated that he had not expected to produce the result that transpired. He said he went in low to make a legal tackle but from a position where his knees were on the ground he stood up not expecting that he would carry 22B beyond the horizontal in the manner that resulted. He referred to his weight (75kg) in comparison to the much greater weight of 22B and stated that he believed 12B had acted effectively as a fulcrum to the action, thus contributing to the way in which 22B came to have his legs in the air with the result that he landed on the head/neck area. The Player told us he checked on 22B's welfare and offered an immediate apology. He said that having watched the footage he was shocked as to how it came to happen and very remorseful. He emphasised the speed at which the event occurred. He stated that it had never been his intention to raise 22B off the ground and into the position where he ended up.
Findings of fact
We were satisfied that the Player was in breach of R 9.18. He did cause 22B to go beyond the horizontal and then make forceful contact with the ground. The actions merited a RC. We were satisfied however that 12B had to a degree influenced the dynamic of the tackle and that the Player had not intended to cause 22B to impact with the surface in the manner that he did. The event happened at high speed and whilst the responsibility rested on the Player to ensure the safety of 22B he was to a degree a victim of an accident of physics (albeit one that was the product of a reckless action on his part) in the context of high speed event.
